

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Trustees of mental Disability Advocacy Center Foundation

I have audited the accompanying Financial Statements of mental Disability Advocacy Center Foundation, ('Foundation') which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December, 2010 – in which the total assets and total liabilities are EUR 476,631 the excess of income over expenses for the year is EUR 43,996 -, and the statement of revenues and expenses, statement of changes in foundation equity and cash flow statement for the year 2010 then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

The Foundation's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Hungarian Standards on Auditing. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I have conducted the audit in accordance with Hungarian Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.





1. General Information

Name of the entity

Mental Disability Advocacy Center (hereinafter: MDAC, Foundation)

The Mental Disability Advocacy Center (MDAC) is a Hungarian foundation (registered by the Capital Court in November 2002, registration number 8689). It was established by the Open Society Institute (OSI). OSI was at that time offering grants to grassroots disability organizations, and in so doing identified a need for a regional human rights organization to specifically challenge human rights abuses against people with disabilities. In 2010 the Foundation employed 13 employees on average.

2. MDAC's activities in 2010

Strategic litigation

MDAC coordinated litigation from five countries and by year end had around 25 cases pending before the European Court of Human Rights, and several more pending domestically. In May the European Court of Human Rights ruled in a case which MDAC initiated, *Alajos Kiss v. Hungary*. The Court ruled that the Hungarian Constitution, which removes the right to vote from more than 67,000 adults with disabilities in Hungary deprived or restricted of legal capacity, is a violation of human rights. MDAC is using this judgment to instigate law reform in several countries as it is the first international court case which has addressed the voting rights of people with disabilities.

In March the European Court gave judgments on compensation of our case of *Shtukaturov v. Russia*, in which in 2008 they had found a string of violations. The Court slated the Russian government for failing to provide remedies to the applicant, and ordered the government to pay 25,000 EUR compensation, one of the largest amounts ever paid in a disability rights case.

In November MDAC's Russian attorney filed two cases at the Russian Constitutional Court challenging arbitrary placement of people deprived of their legal capacity to social care institutions.

Advocacy

In 2010 MDAC carried out a range of advocacy initiatives at the domestic and international levels. MDAC intervened during the summer to improve the declaration and action plan on the rights of children with intellectual disabilities, organised by the European Office of the World Health Organization. In September MDAC organised a side event at the Conference of States Parties to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities at UN headquarters in New York. MDAC attended session of several UN treaty bodies in Geneva.

Following advocacy by the Bulgarian Helsinki Committee and MDAC, the Bulgarian government agreed to amend its legal capacity law. The BHC undertook joint monitoring with the prosecutor to institutions housing children with disabilities and by year end the prosecutor was investigating alleged crimes leading to the deaths of 238 children, the majority caused through neglect and malnutrition.

In Hungary MDAC spent considerable time and effort coordinating the disability caucus responsible for designing the parallel (shadow) report which was submitted to the UN Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities in September. Hungary is the first country where NGOs submitted their shadow report before the government report!

In Russia MDAC carried out several round-tables in Moscow on legal capacity law reform with several NGOs, including an event in April at the Duma, the lower house of parliament, at which MDAC made presentations. MDAC also submitted comments to government and parliament on the draft revision to the Law on Psychiatric Care and the Civil Procedure Code. In December MDAC held an event for local NGOs to strengthen their capacity to advocate for legal capacity law reform.

MDAC worked with the League of Human Rights in the Czech Republic throughout the year, and trained NGOs on how to write a shadow report on the Czech Republic's compliance with the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

In Africa, MDAC sent written comments on the proposed African disability protocol. In the autumn MDAC begun a research project investigating the right to legal capacity in Kenya, in light of its obligations under international human rights law.

Training

In July MDAC strengthened the knowledge and skills of sixteen lawyers and activists on how they can use law to achieve social change, by hosting a two-week summer school on "Mental disability law in practice" at the Central European University in Budapest. In September, MDAC brought together twelve lawyers from Europe for a workshop on how to utilise the litigation opportunities under the Optional Protocol to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

3. Annual contributions and other grants received

OSI was initially the sole donors to MDAC. In 2010 MDAC still received funding from OSI and in addition diversified its funding sources.
